Dear Parents and Carers

I hope that you all had a chance to enjoy the wonderful weather over the Easter holidays. The children have all come back revived and full of enthusiasm. This is a great term with so many things to look forward to.

This year, we spreading out the dates of the summer events as requested by many parents. We will give you the full list next week. Hopefully that will give everyone more of a chance to attend. Also, we have brought the sports morning forward so that we can slot another one in if there is bad weather on our chosen date. The CLP (Huish Community Learning Partnership) will be agreeing the dates for the various sporting activities in the next couple of weeks and we'll add those onto the diary too.

New this term is the Curry Rivel Orchestra! We are inviting every child who learns an instrument and is about Grade 1 to join. Mrs Patterson is very kindly offering her expertise to lead this group and we hope that the orchestra will give their first performance at the Curry Rivel Primary Live event in June. If your child learns an instrument, do encourage them to take part. They may feel reserved or nervous but everyone will have lots of encouragement and support.

We are also really hoping to run a gardening club. Are there any volunteers out there who could give 45 minutes after school on a Wednesday? We have the plants, we have the keen children, we have the equipment - we just don't have enough adults!

Our collective worship theme this term will focus on the three core aims our school has for every child: be a caring citizen, a curious learner and a confident individual. Being a confident individual is particularly important for every child in their approach to learning. It has been great to hear children talking about the progress that they have made and how proud they feel. It's a stepping stone that enables them to be resilient and adventurous. For us, keeping the children confident and calm is particularly important for the children who have the assessments in May. We want each child to feel that they have done their best and not to feel anxious in any way. I am really impressed by their enthusiasm and sense of achievement and that's what we treasure.

An important observation was brought to my attention from one of the school's neighbours. The road crossing from the car park to the school-side pavement is very dangerous. I watched on the first couple of days of term and saw what he meant - an older child walked into the road without looking and a young child ran ahead of a parent onto the road. I will see what advice we can get from the police re warning cones or whatever but please can everyone warn their children of the dangers as I will also do in school.

Although we have only been back for four days, I just wanted to say how proud we are of all the children that have represented the school this week – the cross country runners, the KS1 cricketers and the Y5 and 6 who sang with such verve at the Memory Café. We have had many compliments paid about all of them.
