

Dear Parents and Carers

Our talented athletes surpassed our expectations with a stunning win at the CLP tournament this week. Our team of 28 took part in many different events such as hurdles, throwing, long jump, sprints. We are really proud of their efforts and very grateful to all who supported them on the day.

Requests:

We are still really worried about the waste of money and time taken due to the lack of names on jumpers and cardigans. I have reminded the children about picking up their jumpers when the warning bell goes and always checking at the end of break but it's not always successful! The problem for staff is that when one is left behind, we cannot give it back to its owner and it joins the ever growing pile of lost property.

My next request is that children only bring in fruit or a savoury sandwich for breaktimes. Packets of nibbles, chocolate bars and sugar filled cereal bars have been making an appearance recently. I've explained to the children the reason for these not being a healthy option and hope that we can keep these treats purely for lunchtimes.

Final request: we are hoping that the good weather seen today will continue for the rest of this term and allow us to enjoy our lovely grounds. It will therefore be important for us to be ready with sun protection. Any area that concerns me is when I see sunglasses that do not protect the eyes and potentially will damage them.

Information for you to consider:

'We all know skin can burn in the hot sun - yet few people realise their eyes are also vulnerable. Sometimes they will actually hurt immediately after sun exposure, but more often damage accumulates over the years, leading to sight problems.

The ultraviolet rays from the sun - in particular UVB, the same spectrum of ultraviolet that causes the skin to burn - are most damaging to the eyes. The UVB can damage the lens (which helps focus light) inside the eye. The lens is made up of proteins all in a straight line - that is why the lens is clear. UVB causes those proteins to unravel and tangle so the lens becomes cloudy in places - this is a cataract and can develop after years or decades of sun exposure.

Dark tints can be misleading if you don't check the UV rating. If you have a dark tint, your pupil will dilate to let more light in, providing a bigger window to allow UV in than if you had no sunglasses on.

So please, do check that any sunglasses brought in by your child have proper UV protection. We would prefer the children to have hats or caps as we can be confident that they won't get broken or damaged, and afford good protection too.

I look forward to seeing many of you at the **Curry Rivel Primary Live** next Friday. Fingers crossed for a lovely sunny day so that we can enjoy the children's talents and the fun stalls that the older children have been creating. We also hope to have on display willow creations made by Gala Class as part of their Forest School activities. If you have been designing and building a recycled figure, please bring it in at any time next week for us to be able to position it safely for everyone to enjoy. Finally, we will expect all children to stay for the whole afternoon. At about 3pm, we will get the children back into school to do our final sorting out of the week and to make sure that the stalls are packed away safely, and then the children will come out at 3.15pm as normal.


